- Our annual state appropriation was increased by 19%!
- Enrollment of full-time, on-campus students increased 4.8%.

- In November, we celebrated 50 years as a technical agriculture college.

Delegation from Panama visits NCTA

NCTA hosted a Panamanian study group March 10-12 to the NCTA campus, for a tour of the John and Barb Scharf farm near Curtis, and to research facilities of the West Central Research and Extension Center at North Platte.

Presidential advisors for agriculture, education and industry competitiveness represented President Juan Carlos Varela in exploring NCTA's teaching programs and curriculum for technical agriculture.

Leading the delegation was Dr. Miguel Angel Esbri, executive secretary for competiveness and logistics in the President's cabinet.

NCTA is communicating further with Dr. Esbri and Dr. Dario Solis, Office of the Vice President for Research at Texas Tech University, who is providing consulting input to his native Panama. Within the next few years, Panama intends to design, build and fully implement educational programs for a new technical college for agriculture and ranching.

Dean Rosati and NCTA faculty and staff detailed information on livestock and crops production, animal health, and ag mechanics, the three primary areas of interest for Panamanian technical training and workforce development. We look forward to building a partnership with our new Panamanian friends.





Agronomy prof wins teaching award

When Brad Ramsdale went to Lincoln for a recognition event in February it was only appropriate that several crops judging students made the trip too.

Ramsdale, associate professor of agronomy, was awarded the Holling Family Award for Teaching Excellence in Agriculture and Natural Resources.

"Dr. Ramsdale is an outstanding faculty member - well deserving of the recognition bestowed upon him by receiving a Holling Family Award," said NCTA Dean Ron Rosati.

"His students benefit from the high degree of creativity and intelligence he displays in the classroom. Brad is especially skilled at taking complex research findings and showing the students how they apply in practical, field applications."

Ramsdale arrived at NCTA in 2007 and started the collegiate crops judging team in 2010. Students have steadily progressed in contest rankings in six years.

Nolan Breece, Dalton Johnson, Aaron Jensen and Ross Steward attended the awards ceremony with their mentor.

"I was honored to introduce Dr. Ramsdale for this award. I have had many valuable experiences through crops judging, Farm Bureau club, and classes that were made possible by Dr. Ramsdale," Steward said.

"His recognition for teaching excellence reflects his dedication to the students at NCTA and has made an impact on me and other students," Steward added. "He is helping to lay the foundation for the next generation in agriculture."

Ramsdale founded the NCTA Honors Program, Collegiate Farm Bureau, and now coordinates NCTA's academic assessment and reporting. He also supervises agricultural mechanics and irrigation technology programs.

He is the eighth NCTA faculty to receive the award with Senior Faculty, Judy Bowmaster-Cole, 2005; Del VanDerWerff, 2003; Jerry Sundquist, 2000; and Jo Bek, 1999; Junior Faculty, Cory Reng, 2009; Clyde Cranwell, 2005; and James Kennedy, 1999.

NCTA adds welding certificate; Learn program updates on June 11th

State and industry certifications for students in Dan Stehlik's welding programs are gaining traction.

NCTA was approved for an undergraduate certificate in agricultural welding. With 16 credit hours, students are workforce-ready or they can progress into the Agriculture Equipment Management option of an Associate of Applied Science degree.

Stehlik, an UNSTA alumnus who taught high school and community college welding and agricultural education courses in Kansas and earlier in Nebraska, joined NCTA faculty in August, 2015. He also teaches the electricity courses required for the Irrigation Technician's program.

Welding is popular with many students in Agricultural Education, Diversified Agriculture and other programs. Eventually, more continuing education for FFA instructors can occur each summer.

If successful in program expansion with commercial equipment and slight changes to existing

curriculum, NCTA's welding program could soon meet standards for certification by the American Welding Society (AWS). Hear more details at the June 11th alumni reunion. Better yet, come to campus and see first-hand the exciting growth of the Agricultural Mechanics programs.

Aspen Prize Program The Nebraska College of Technical Agriculture at Curtis was named as a Top 150 two-year institution by the Aspen Institute College Excellence Program.

"NCTA is proud to be selected for this prestigious honor which recognizes the college's statewide mission with the University of Nebraska system for an affordable, guality education," said Ron Rosati, NCTA dean. "We educate skilled, career-ready graduates in agriculture."

The nomination enabled NCTA to compete for the 2017 Aspen Prize for Community College Excellence. High achievement and performance criteria in four areas are evaluated: student learning, certificate and degree completion, employment and earnings, and access and success for minority and low-income students.

NCTA has a strong record of facilitating student success. The graduation rate is 46 percent, and the retention rate is 66 percent, both well above the state average for two-year institutions and community colleges, Rosati said. 6
