Aggies Commit to Complete

CURTIS, Neb. – A successful college student is one who receives a diploma, certificate or credentials after months or years of dedicated studies.

Then, with the title of graduate and alumnus, that individual enters the workforce educated and prepared for a career.

Last week, the University of Nebraska, which includes NCTA in Curtis, expanded its Commit to Complete campaign with an aim to minimize college costs and grow the workforce by encouraging students to graduate on time.

We wholeheartedly endorse this campaign, which was initially launched in 2016. We appreciate our partners in public higher education, businesses and state government who unite to address the workforce needs of Nebraska.

Employers value the skilled graduates from NCTA who are veterinary technicians, livestock producers, agribusiness managers, farmers and certified agronomists, welders and irrigation technicians, and other professionals.

These graduates complete an affordable, quality program to earn their associate degree in two years. Some may add a second major in an additional year. We also off certificate programs such as those in animal care or irrigation technician in a two-semester format.

All institutions report graduate assessments annually. The Nebraska Coordinating Commission on Post-Secondary Education review of two-year institutions in the state shows NCTA leads graduation rates with 50% in the 10-year period of 2007-2017.

"Nebraskans rightfully want to know what we're doing to ensure that our students graduate on time, with as little debt as possible, and with the skills they need to succeed in the workforce," said Susan Fritz, NU's interim president.

"Attracting and retaining more talent in our state is certainly part of the solution to the workforce crisis. But as institutions of higher learning, we also have a responsibility to help our students complete their academic journey on time."

Commit to Complete offers a four-step plan for degree completion: Visit your adviser. Make a plan. Stay on track. Graduate sooner. See a brief video at https://committocomplete.com/

Because of our smaller size at NCTA and many opportunities for one-on-one conversations between students and their faculty advisors, the planning process and open communication is valuable. We are committed to our Aggie students to help them achieve success!
